

Diplomats Gather in Belfast for First Diplomatic Dinner

Belfast, NORTHERN IRELAND: A group of diplomats from across the world were in Belfast today to attend the first ever Diplomatic Dinner in the city. The dinner was hosted by the Consular Corps/Association of Northern Ireland (CA-NI) and Co-operation Ireland was nominated by them as being the beneficiary charity. Invest NI, the European Commission, Donnelly Group and the Northern Ireland Chamber of Commerce supported the event.

More than 22 countries were represented at the dinner, which took place at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, Shaw's Bridge. It was an opportunity to welcome Ambassadors, High Commissioners and senior Diplomats to Northern Ireland and celebrate the increasing multiculturalism and diversity of Northern Ireland society. Ambassadors from Russia, Hungary, Guatemala, Bulgaria, Netherland and Czech Republic attended in addition to Consul Generals from the USA, China, Italy and Poland.
